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Ask He of the Cord Rain in the Time of the Catter Rain



HE earnest of a blessing is not the end of the blessing. God has given us an earnest of latter rain, and He has not exhausted heaven. God has more than one cloud in His heavens.

What brings rain? What draws rain? Mountain peaks. The peaks that pierce through the sky. The clouds concentrate around the peaks and condense around high peaks; rain is precipitated from them and the overflow goes into the valley.

God wants His peaks today piercing through the clouds to heaven, bringing forth blessing, peaks around which clouds of blessing can condense and concentrate. God wants His Rockies today piercing the heavens and forming channels; conductors of heavenly rain, latter rain, down to the hot valleys and plain below.

And God's despised people today, who have experienced latter rain, it is for them to look, to pray for more rain. To him that hath shall be given. And if you think you have enough of a former rain you will get no more. The oil to that widow woman stayed when there were no more vessels (2 Kings 4:6). She guaged God's resources by the vessels she put before God. She got just what she expected and no more. Blessed are they that hunger and thirst, for they shall be filled.

If you have a little and are satisfied you will get no more.

If you want floods, you will have floods; if you want drops, you will have drops. If you are content with the last drops you had, you will have no more.

Elijah prayed not for a shower. He prayed until he got abundance of rain.

God has got rain and we need it.

God's heavens are not bankrupt of natural rain, and He who is Spirit has more spiritual rain than natural rain. There is more sea than there is land, and God can make enough rain out of the sea to drown the land; and there is a larger proportion of spiritual rain, enough to cover the whole drought-covered earth. There is enough for all flesh.

Satan is not going to have the majority. Christ died for all, and the knowledge of His salvation is going to cover the earth as the waters cover the sea.

God covered the former earth in judgment with water, and deluged, drowned, and swallowed up iniquity; and God is going to send another flood, a flood of grace, a deluge, to swallow up iniquity with grace. Where sin abounds grace shall much more abound.

Those who have experienced the latter rain are the most privileged on the earth. Prophets have a right to pray down rain, and if you are in the school of prophets you have a right to pray. You have the prophecies of God, God's promises, and you have a right to ask. "Ask and it shall be given," is the Word of God.

THE GIFTS OF HEALING AND THE WORKING OF MIRACLES

God has given us much in these last days, and where much is given much will be required. The Lord has said to us, "Ye are the salt of the earth: but if the salt have lost his savor, wherewith shall it be salted? It is thenceforth good for nothing, but to be cast out, and to be trodden under foot of men." We see a thought on the same line when our Lord Jesus says, "If a man abide not in Me, he is cast forth as a branch, and is withered; and men gather them, and cast them into the fire, and they are burned." On the other hand He tells us, "If ye abide in Me, and My words abide in you, ye shall ask what ye will, and it shall be done unto you." If we do not move on with the Lord these days, and do not walk in the light of revealed truth, we shall become as the savorless salt, as a withered branch. This one thing we must do, forgetting those things that are behind, the past failures and the past blessings, we must reach forth for those things which are before, and press toward the mark for the prize of our high calling of God in Christ

For many years the Lord has been moving me on and keeping me from spiritual stagnation. When I was in the Wesleyan Methodist Church I was sure I was saved and was sure I was all right. The Lord said to me, "Come out," and I came out. When I was with the people known as the Brethren I was sure I was all right now. But the Lord said, "Come out." Then I went into the Salvation Army. At that time it was full of life and there were revivals everywhere. But the Salvation Army went into natural things and the great revivals that they had in those early days ceased. The Lord said to me, "Come out," and I came out. I have had to come out three times since. I believe that this Pentecostal revival that we are now in is the best thing that the Lord has on the earth today, and yet I believe that God has something out of this that is going to be still better. God has no use for any man who is not hungering and thirsting for yet more of Himself and His righteousness.

The Lord has told us to covet earnestly the best gifts, and we need to be covetous for those that will bring Him most glory. We need to see the gifts of healing and the working of miracles in operation today. Some say that it is necessary for us to have the gift of discernment in operation with the gifts of healing, but even apart from this gift I believe the Holy Ghost will have a divine revelation for us as we deal with the sick. Most people seem to have discernment, or think they have, and if they would turn it on themselves for twelve months they would never want to discern again. The gift of discernment is not criticism. I am satisfied that in Pentecostal circles today that our paramount need is more perfect love.

Perfect love will never want the preeminence in everything, it will never want to take the place of another, it will always be willing to take the back seat. If you go to a convention there is always someone who wants to give a message, who wants to be heard. If you have a desire to go to a convention you should have three things settled in your mind. Do I want to be heard? Do I want to be seen?

Do I want anything on the line of finances? If I have these things in my heart I have no right to be there. The one thing that must move us must be the constraining love of God to minister for Him. A preacher always loses out when he gets his mind on finances. It is well for Pentecostal preachers to avoid making much of finances except to stir up people to help our missionaries on financial lines. A preacher who gets big collections for the missionaries need never fear, the Lord will take care of his finances. A preacher should not land at a place and say that God had sent him. I am always fearful when I hear a man advertising this. If he is sent of God, the saints will know it. God has His plans for His servants and we must so live in His plans that He will place us where He wants us. If you seek nothing but the will of God, He will always put you in the right place at the right time. I want you to see that the gifts of healing and the working of miracles are part of the Spirit's plan and will come forth in operation as we are working along that plan. I must know the movement of the Spirit and the voice of God. I must understand the will of God if I am to see the gifts of the Spirit in operation.

The gifts of healing are so varied. You may go and see ten people and every case is different. I am never happier in the Lord than when I am in a bedroom with a sick person. I have had more revelations of the Lord's presence when I have ministered to the sick at their bedsides than at any other time. It is as your heart goes out to the needy ones in deep compassion that the Lord manifests His presence. You are able to locate their position. It is then that you know that you must be filled with the Spirit to deal with the conditions before you.

Where people are in sickness you find frequently that they are dense about Scripture. They usually know three scriptures though. They know about Paul's thorn in the flesh, and that Paul told Timothy to take a little wine for his stomach's sake, and that Paul left someone sick somewhere; they forget his name, and don't remember the name of the place, and don't know where the chapter is. Most people think they have a thorn in the flesh. The chief thing in dealing with a person who is sick is to locate their exact position. As you are ministering under the Spirit's power the Lord will let you see just that which will be most helpful and most faith-inspiring to them.

When I was in the plumbing business I enjoyed praying for the sick. Urgent calls would come and I would have no time to wash, and with my hands all black I would preach to these sick ones, my heart all aglow with love. Ah, you must have your heart in the thing when you pray for the sick. You have to get right to the bottom of the cancer with a divine compassion and then you will see the gifts of the Spirit in operation.

I was called at 10 o'clock one night to pray for a young person given up by the doctor who was dying of consumption. As I looked, I saw that unless God understook it was impossible for her to live. I turned to the mother and said, "Well, mother, you will have

to go to bed." She said, "Oh, I have not had my clothes off for three weeks." I said to the daughters, "You will have to go to bed," but they did not want to go. It was the same with the son. I put on my overcoat and said, "Good-bye, I'm off." They said, "Oh, don't leave us." I said, "I can do nothing here." They said, "Oh, if you will stop, we will all go to bed." I knew that God would move nothing in an atmosphere of mere natural sympathy and unbelief.

They all went to bed and I stayed, and that was surely a time as I knelt by that bed face to face with death and with the devil. But God can change the hardest situation and make you know that He is al-

mighty.

Then the fight came. It seemed as though the heavens were brass. I prayed from 11 to 3:30 in the morning. I saw the glimmering light on the face of the sufferer and saw her pass away. The devil said, "Now you are done for. You have come from Bradford and the girl has died on your hands." I said, "It can't be. God did not send me here for nothing. This is a time to change strength." I remembered that passage which said, "Men ought always to pray and not to faint." Death had taken place but I knew that my God was all powerful, and He that had split the Red Sea is just the same today. It was a time when I would not have "No," and God said "Yes." I looked at the window and at that moment the face of Jesus appeared. It seemed as though a million rays of light were coming from His face. As He looked at the one who had just passed away, the color came back to the face. She rolled over and fell asleep. Then I had a glorious time. In the morning she woke early, put on a dressing gown and walked to the piano. She started to play and to sing a wonderful song. The mother and the sister and the brother had all come down to listen. The Lord had undertaken. A miracle had been wrought.

The Lord is calling us along this way. I am thanking God for difficult cases. The Lord has called us into heart union with Himself; He wants His bride to have one heart and one Spirit with Him and to do what He Himself loved to do. That case had to be a miracle. The lungs were gone, they were just in shreds, but the Lord restored lungs that were per-

fectly sound.

There is a fruit of the Spirit that must accompany the gift of healing and that is longsuffering. The man who is going through with God to be used in healing must be a man of longsuffering. He must be always ready with a word of comfort. If the sick one is in distress and helpless and does not see everything eye to eye with you, you must bear with them. Our Lord Jesus Christ was filled with compassion and lived and moved in a place of longsuffering, and we will have to get into this place if we are to help needy ones.

There are some times when you pray for the sick and you are apparently rough. But you are not dealing with a person, you are dealing with the Satanic forces that are binding the person. Your heart is full of love and compassion to all, but you are moved to a holy anger as you see the place the devil has taken in the body of the sick one, and you deal with his position with a real forcefulness. One day a pet dog followed a lady out of her house and ran all round her feet. She said to the dog, "My dear, I cannot have you with me today." The dog wagged its tail and made a big fuss. She said, "Go home, my dear." But

the dog did not go. At last she shouted roughly, "Go home," and off it went. Some people deal with the devil like that. The devil can stand all the comfort you like to give him. Cast him out! You are dealing not with the person, you are dealing with the devil. Demon power must be dislodged in the name of the Lord. You are always right when you dare to deal with sickness as with the devil. Much sickness is caused by some misconduct, there is something wrong, there is some neglect somewhere, and Satan has had a chance to get in. It is necessary to repent and confess where you have given place to the devil, and then he can be dealt with.

When you deal with a cancer case, recognize that it is a living evil spirit that is destroying the body. I had to pray for a woman in Los Angeles one time who was suffering with cancer, and as soon as it was cursed it stopped bleeding. It was dead. The next thing that happened was that the natural body pressed it out, because the natural body had no room for dead matter. It came out like a great big ball with tens of thousands of fibers. All these fibers had been pressing into the flesh. These evil powers move to get further hold of the system, but the moment they are destroyed their hold is gone. Jesus said to His disciples that He gave them power to loose and power to bind. It is our privilege in the power of the Holy Ghost to loose the prisoners of Satan and to let the oppressed go free.

Take your position in the first epistle of John and declare, "Greater is He that is in me than he that is in the world." Then recognize that it is not yourself that has to deal with the power of the devil, but the Greater One that is in you. Oh, what it means to be filled with Him. You can do nothing of yourself, but He that is in you will win the victory. Your being has become the temple of the Spirit. Your mouth, your mind, your whole being becomes exercised and

worked upon by the Spirit of God.

I was called to a certain town in Norway. The hall seated about 1500 people. When I got to the place it was packed, and hundreds were trying to get in. There were some policemen there. The first thing I did was to preach to the people outside the building. Then I said to the policemen, "It hurts me very much that there are more people outside than inside and I feel I must preach to the people. I would like you to get me the market place to preach in." They secured for me a great park and a big stand was erected and I was able to preach to thousands. After the preaching we had some wonderful cases of healing. One man came a hundred miles bringing his food with him. He had not been passing anything through his stomach for over a month as he had a great cancer on his stomach. He was healed at that meeting, and opening his parcel, he began eating before all the people. There was a young woman there with a stiff hand. Instead of the mother making the child use her arm she had allowed the child to keep the arm dormant until it was stiff, and she had grown up to be a young woman and was like the woman that was bowed down with the spirit of infirmity. As she stood before me I cursed the spirit of infirmity in the name of Jesus. It was instantly cast out and the arm was free. Then she waved it all over. At the close of the meeting the devil laid out two people with fits. When the devil is manifesting himself, then is the time to deal with him. Both of these people were

A Word Concerning a Very Important Matter

It is a pleasure to greet the saints through the Evangel. It is very encouraging to be able to feel that the great "Evangel Family" are standing together in faith and unity, to see the will of God done in the whole world so far as we may have a part in doing so. •

The matter especially on my heart as I write you is the Bible School that is being prepared for at Springfield. Every days brings its quota of letters from interested persons who inquire about the school. Their questions are, "Will the school open again this fall?" "Will the new building be ready? Oh, how I long for that place." "Can I come, and what is required of students?" Prospective students are writing in every day. While we can thank God for all other good schools and the good work done by them, we see clearly the imperative need of this Central School. At this writing it seems clear that the building now under way will not afford room enough for all who wish to come. We must do all we can—and trust God to help us mightily— for the dear ones who are determined to prepare for effective work on the fields.

The responsibility for the directing of the building project has fallen almost entirely upon me, and the faithful Pentecostal brother who is acting as foreman. Since our precious brother and Chairman has gone to be with the Lord I feel as though I had lost that which cannot well be replaced. I dare not think of anything but a yet more strenuous effort to carry the load and win the victory, leaning hard upon the Lord

We have the foundation walls up and about onehalf of the material for the walls, etc., on the ground, and paid for. No work has been done above the first sub-floor. The money we had to begin with is about expended, together with what has been sent in. We must have \$2,000 almost at once to meet bills that are coming. Then we shall need at least \$500.00 each week to pay the brick layers and carpenters and for materials while the walls are going up. I know that God is able to show us the way through. I feel assured that our people will trust Him together and send in the money. Anything like a serious delay will result in a real hindrance to every prospective student. The burden of the work is heavy upon me today, but the supreme cry of my heart is for the needed funds that the work may go forward.

Will you please lay the paper down when you have read this, and go before God in prayer for this great

cause, and great need? Pray as you can when you are touched in your heart for **others**. Ask God to supply the present and future needs of HIS SCHOOL at Springfield; and "Whatsoever He saith unto you, do it."

Remember that September 2 is set aside as Bible School day, but we shall need funds before then. On that day let all our people pray and give for Bible School work. If you are situated where your interest would naturally be fixed in some other school than the one here, give to that school and pray for all such schools over the land.

I feel better after having written this to you, and I shall watch the mail for your practical help in the way of offerings, and may God comfort, prosper and reward every one of you.

"For this we say unto you by the word of the Lord, that we which are alive and remain unto the coming of the Lord shall not prevent them which are asleep. delivered, and when they stood up and thanked and praised the Lord what a wonderful time we had.

We need to wake up and be on the stretch to believe God. Before God could bring me to this place He has broken me a thousand times. I have wept, I have groaned, I have travailed many a night until God broke me. It seems to me that until God has mowed you down you never can have this longsuffering for others. We can never have the gifts of healing and the working of miracles in operation only as we stand in the divine power that God gives us and we stand believing God, and having done all we still stand believing.

We have been seeing wonderful miracles these last days and they are only a little of what we are going to see. I believe that we are right on the threshold of wonderful things, but I want to emphasize that all these things will be through the power of the Holy Ghost. You must not think that these gifts will fall upon you like ripe cherries. There is a sense in which you have to pay the price for everything you get. We must be covetous for God's best gifts, and say Amen to any preparation the Lord takes us through, in order that we may be humble, useable vessels through whom He Himself can operate by means of the Spirit's power.

CONCERNING DRESS

Though plainness in dress is not a sure evidence of discipleship, it is a very desirable thing.

In a social gathering of Pentecostal people which I recently attended I was pained to notice that numbers were so scantily clad. At the spectacle which met my astonished gaze, feelings of indignation were followed by those of disgust. I felt deep pity for some young men present who are not too familiar with the ways of the world and not so deep in God as some present who were better able to rise quickly above the distressing scene.

I am not here to tell people how to dress; but for Jesus' sake and for your own sake, and for the sake of the younger men, I entreat you to be careful on this line.

I heard the dress of folk in another church discussed. It was said that the folk at Robert Street dressed much the same. So you see others keep a tab on us; they know what our fashions and styles are. We are not a secret order. The public can in-

vestigate.

John Wesley preached a sermon on "Dress" after having been fifty years in the ministry. There must have been great necessity, or he would not have spoken so plainly: "Do you still dress like other people of the same fortune? Is not your dress as gay, as expensive, as theirs who never had any such warning? as expensive as it would have been if you had never heard a word said about it? O, how will you. answer this when you and I stand together at the judgment-seat of Christ? Nay, have many of you grown finer as fast as you have grown richer? As you increased in substance, have you not increased in dress? Witness the profusion of ribands, gauze, or linen about your heads. What have you profited then by bearing the reproach of Christ? by being called Methodists? Are you not as fashionably dressed as others of your rank that are no Methodists? Do you ask, 'But may we not as well buy fashionable things as unfashionable?' I answer, 'Not if they give you a bold, immodest look. . . And not if they cost more.' 'But I can **afford** it.' O lay aside forever that idle, nonsensical word! No Christian can afford to waste any part of the substance which God has entrusted him with. How long are you to stay here? May not you tomorrow, perhaps tonight, be summoned to arise and go hence, in order to give an account of this and all your talents to the Judge of the quick and the dead?

"All the time you are studying this outward adorning, the whole inward work of the Spirit stands still, or rather goes back, though by very gentle and almost imperceptible degrees. Instead of growing more heavenly minded, you are more and more earthly minded. If you once had fellowship with the Father and the Son, it now gradually declines, and you insensibly sink deeper into the spirit of the world—into foolish and hurtful desires, and groveling appetites. All these evils, and a thousand more, spring from that one root, indulging yourself in costly apparel."

The devil is back of immodest dress. Why do not people flee from the face of the serpent in the attire of folk? If people appeared in public twenty-five

years ago in the attire many have adopted, they would have been called immoral people who earn their living by a life of shame.

Nudity creates lust and feeds lust, and is a sore temptation to men whose weakness was uncleanness before they were saved. We dare no longer appear to wink at this sin. We appeal to you mothers who are responsible for the dress of the younger women. We appeal to you not to permit your daughters to appear in public scantily attired.

I have been tempted to wish that the wearing of a uniform were a compulsory matter; for a uniform is better than extremes in fashion which so misrepresent our profession. The seriousness of the situation has constrained me to speak so plainly, and I speak out of a heart of tenderness towards all who are concerned.

Beloved, the lesson contained in the story of the Walnut Tree is age old in its application. It is simply this:

Cooperation beats abuse a million-fold, in producing results out of trees, people, or institutions.

Take the Pentecostal movement, like your own district or assembly, for example. A little cooperation goes a long way to make it more efficient in the performance of its duties for you. Remember, if you are a member, you are an integral part of that body and should bear your share of the responsibilities and work of the assembly and district with which you are affiliated. Abuse, on the other hand, only handicaps it in its functions. Are you a lifter or a loafer—which? Do you boost, or knock? Really—be honest—are you criticizing or cooperating?

One of the greatest needs in the church today is cooperation; cooperation among the ministers and leaders, especially; among the editors of our publications; among the parents and Sunday school teachers; among the members, one and all.

Every wide-awake minister and worker should interest himself in the activities of his assembly and the movement in general. He should know what their problems, their duties, their privileges are. He should have a definite work to perform—and do it with all his heart.

Are you breaking the branches of the walnut tree in your assembly? in your movement? Or are you acting in such a manner that you will receive an even bigger crop of fruit in coming days? Sunday.—"But if ye will not drive out the inhabitants of the land from before you; then it shall come to pass, that those which ye let remain of them shall be pricks in your eyes, and thorns in your sides, and shall vex you in the land wherein ye dwell" (Num. 33:55).

This is just the story, dear young people, of God's dealing in our own individual lives. That thing which we hold back from God and nurse to our bosom as the secret idol we hope God would not ask of us, becomes the snare and ofttimes the cause of our spiritual downfall. The consecration must be complete; the separation from the world must be complete; the death must be complete if we would know the fulness of a resurrection life and victorious walk in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Monday.—"For unto you it is given in the behalf of Christ, not only to believe on Him, but also to suffer for His sake" (Phil. 1:29).

"For all through life I see a cross,

Where the sons of God yield up their breath;

There is no gain except by loss,

There is no life except by death;

There is no vision but by faith,

No glory but in bearing shame,

No justice but in taking blame:

And that Eternal Passion sayeth

Be emptied of glory and right and name."

Tuesday.—"They helped every one his neighbor; and every one said to his brother, Be of good courage" (1sa. 41:6).

"Down amid the depths of heathen darkness

There are heroes true and brave;

Shrinking not from death, or toil, or danger,

They have gone to help and save.

But we hear them crying, 'Do not leave us

'Mid these dreadful depths to drown,

Let us feel your arms of prayer around us;

Hold the ropes as we go down."

Wednesday.—"Even the youths shall faint and be weary, and the young men shall utterly fall: but they that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength" (Isa. 40:30).

The glory of most young people is in their strength, and this is where sometimes they miss the great secret of realizing that it is not their strength but the strength of God that is going to make them overcomers. Human strength, human love, human ability is ever liable to failure. There is only one thing sure, only one thing which does not fail, and that is our God. How necessary, then, that we not only know Him, but wait upon Him and thus possess strength and life and love which shall endure when the test comes.

Thursday.—"Take My yoke upon you, and learn of Me; for I am meek and lowly in heart: and ye shall find rest unto your souls" (Matt. 11:29).

"Let us feel nothing but a very determined and persevering waiting upon God and Christ will discover how lacking we are in the grace of humility, and how impotent to obtain what we seek. Let us study the character of Christ until our souls are filled with the love and admiration of His lowliness. And let us believe that, when we are broken down under a sense of our pride, and our impotence to cast it out, Jesus Christ Himself will come in to impart this grace, too, as a part of His wondrous life within us."

Friday.—"God hath broken in upon mine enemics by mine hand like the breaking forth of waters" (1 Chron. 14:11).

This is not the boast of a man who icels his own strength. Rather is it the ascribing of full glory to the God who only doest wondrous things. Is there not very often an apparent desire with most of us to exploit the part our hand has played and underestimate the God-side of the victory. Place the glory altogether where it belongs, and you will have ever-increasing occasion for rejoicing.

Saturday,—"Now the man Moses was very meck, above all men which were upon the face of the earth" (Num. 12:3).

Meek, yes, but certainly not weak. But the material God chooses for great enterprises must be material that does not become easily warped by the strain and position they occupy. The very "sheep-tending" experience you may be having now on the backside of some desert is perhaps God's preparation in your life for future service. God may have a Moses in the process of making. Let Him work in you to will and to do of His own good pleasure, and remember that the meek shall inherit the earth.

THE MESSAGE OF THE BLOOD

"Ye are come . . . to the blood of sprinkling that SPEAK-ETH better things than that of Abel" (Heb. 12:24).

1. The blood speaks safety.

"When I see the blood, I will pass over you" (Ex. 12:13). The passover lamb had to be slain and the blood had to be sprinkled on the two side posts and upper door post. Christ our passover has been sacrificed for us, and we can come for personal sprinkling. When we do this we are assured of personal safety. There is safety only in the shelter of the blood.

2. The blood speaks peace.

"Having made peace through the blood of his cross . . . you . . . hath he reconciled" (Col. 1:20).

The blood of Christ is the only ground of reconciliation, and those who do not accept the blood atonement forsake their own mercy. Without the shedding of blood THERE IS NO REMISSION of sins.

3. The blood speaks justification.

"God commended his love toward us, in that, while we were sinners, Christ died for us. Much more then, being now justified by his blood, we shall be saved from wrath through him" (Rom. 5:8,9).

We are honorably acquitted, for another has suffered for our guilt.

4. The blood speaks redemption.

"In whom we have redemption through his blood" (Eph. 1:7). And this is not a temporary business. When Christ, through the ETERNAL SPIRIT offered Himself without spot to God, He obtained an ETERNAL REDEMPTION for us, that we might receive the promise of ETERNAL INHERITANCE (Heb. 9:12-15).

5. The blood speaks sanctification.

"Wherefore Jesus also, that he might sanctify the people with his own blood, suffered without the gate" (Heb. 13:12). Holiness is not a man-made product, but our Calvary inheri-

The blood speaks cleansing.

"The blood of Jesus Christ his Son cleanseth us from all sin" (1 John 1:7).

Present-tense cleansing. Just as the blood that flows in the human body keeps bone and ligament and other parts constantly clean, so in the body of Christ, every member is cleansed by the constant flow of the ever-efficacious blood of Jesus. The condition for this constant cleansing is constant walking in the light.

7. The blood speaks victory.

"They overcame him (the accuser of the brethren) by the blood of the Lamb, and by the word of their testimony" (Rev. 12:11).

They overcame him who tried to overcome Jesus. The blood is the only defeat Satan will acknowledge. As sure as the blood is shed, so is his doom sealed. Praise the Lord for the wondrous victory wrought through the blood. There is victory for all saints all the time in all circumstances through the blood.

The song of triumph has already come to the earth, and we are taking up the strain: "Unto him that loved us, and washed us from our sins in his own blood . . . to him be glory and dominion forever and ever" (Rev. 1:5,6). Keep the song going. It will obliterate the songs of hell.

"Absalom's vanity let his hair grow long; and his long hair did the service of the hangman's rope. Let parents hear the warning voice, and teach their children from earliest days to reckon the fear of God their best ornament."

TRIUMPHS IN TULSA

The seven weeks' campaign by the Richey Brothers in Tulsa, Oklahoma, closed Sunday, giving the last night to the negroes. This is said by Mr. Richey and party to be the greatest revival he has ever held. The number of professed conversions is 10,400—9,000 healing cards were issued. Hundreds of people came from out of town, who did not have enough money to pay for lodging and meals for two or three days. Tulsa restaurants gave meal tickets for them free, and there were 1,115 fed in this way during the seven weeks. Individual contributions by citizens helped to meet this worthy need.

A Persuasive Procession

On Saturday night before the closing Sunday, a strange and striking procession took place in the streets of Tulsa. We glean from the Tulsa Daily World the following:

All traffic stopped in down town Tulsa at 10 o'clock Saturday night. Not a wheel turned, the clang and the noise of the city's Saturday night was suddenly stilled while Tulsa watched the strangest parade that ever passed through its streets.

They were the hundreds who claim to have found through the prayers of a young evangelist the merciful healing of God. Two by two they marched up Main Street, men and women, old and young and little children. The Donkey band that led them played the glory song of the revival; they followed the slender man whose faith and prayers they believed brought God's healing, and who walked with his wife and members of his evangelistic party.

Truck Carries Crutches

Midway in the parade came a truck piled high with discarded crutches; from two of these crutches dangled a pair of little shoes with their hard iron braces. Many of the marchers carried their own crutches, some of them one, some of them two. Three cars brought up the rear, in them people, some well-known in Tulsa, who shouted continually. "Praise the Lord!"

It was just before 10 o'clock when the parade reached Third and Main. As soon as pedestrians and people in cars read the signs carried by the marchers, "God Heals," "10,000 converted in the Richey meetings," "These are people healed in the Richey meetings," a sudden silence fell upon Tulsa's busiest street. People closed in close to the marchers, street cars and automobiles were lined up as far on Main Street as the eye could see, but there was hardly a sound as the parade marched by.

Occasional Revival Songs

Occasionally a group of marchers would sing a snatch of a revival song. Some of them still carried their right hands high as those in the healing line at the tabernacle do, and praised the Lord. A little boy passed, carrying high a crutch, his face radiant. A murmur

passed through the crowd, a sound repeated again and again as some happyfaced man or woman, carrying crutch or walking stick, marched by.

Old couples, white-haired, walked arm in arm. Young fellows swung along to-together; there were fathers and mothers with their children; there were bobbedheads among young girls in their bright sweaters; there were boys in knee trousers; business men, old men—some of whom walked with a slight limp, but who carried triumphantly aloft a walking stick as a signal of triumph over the enemy, rheumatism.

But while crutches and walking sticks were tangible evidence Saturday night of cures claimed to have been made at the Richey Tabernacle during the last seven weeks, tabernacle records show that the people who marched suffered from virtually every disease under the sun

Two Interesting Cases

Margaret Conway, whose back was broken in an automobile accident last winter, was at the meeting. She told workers that she could stand now and walk a little with some one holding her and that for the first time she can move her feet of her own volition. She says her knees are stronger and that the hump on her back is getting smalled all the time. By the time Richey gets back, she says, she'll be walking.

One of the cases attracting attention at the meeting is that of Mittie Lee Adams, brought to Tulsa by her aunt, Mrs. Pattie Adams Shriner, from Coffeyville, Mississippi. The child, who suffered from infantile paralysis, has discarded trutches, and it is claimed that her limb has grown two inches since she was prayed for three weeks ago. She no longer wears a built-up shoe nor a brace.

The following is an editorial under the caption, given in The Tulsa Tribune:

The remarkable Richey meetings here are closing tonight. Raymond Richev and his associates will move to another field. They will be accompanied by the grateful blessings of hundreds. Richeys came to Tulsa with nothing but faith. But their faith has been more than enough to make the meetings wonderfully successful from every standpoint save that of money collections. They make no appeal for funds as they depart. Money is not and has not been their object. But the voluntary move headed by several prominent Tulsans to collect a substantial fund for the Richeys surely merits generous support-

The complete absence of the dollar appeal from their revival services really has been noteworthy. Richey has been concerned greatly with lending prayerful assistance to folks who are suffering from physical or mental ills, and he has been concerned not at all with the cash register. With an inspiring eagerness to serve God and men, this young evangelist has both preached and practiced the

Gospel that Jesus Christ gave to mankind twenty centuries ago. There is not the slightest egotism in his evangelism. It is God's almighty power that works the cures which we term miraculous, Richey says, and by abundant faith in Him are these miracles made possible.

It is not a new doctrine. It is as old as Christianity. Yet many people talk about this manifestation here in Tulsa as something new and startling.

The vital element of that doctrine today is gaining a new ascendancy. And whatever our individual opinions may be concerning the physical or religious aspect of these remarkable transitions at the Richey meetings as the lame, the halt, and the blind are cured, surely we all can rejoice that these suffering people have been made well and happy, and that 12,400 have professed a new faith in God.

In short, it is a matter for common gratitude that the Richeys are leaving Tulsa a better community than they found it.—Selected.

The city of Binghamton, N. Y. has just witnessed a very remarkable campaign on the line of healing, with many saved, and a number filled with the Holy Spirit. The meeting was conducted by the Argue Evangelistic Trio. The general conviction expressed by all the workers present was that they had never witnessed a greater manifestation of God's healing power. In spite of the fact that this is a city of most conservative church people, not given to attending revivals, the many cards received from those coming for spiritual or physical help showed that the Catholic Church, the Episcopal, Methodist, Presbyterian, Baptist, Lutheran, Evangelical, Christian, The Salvation Army, the Christian Aliance and others, as well as City Missions were all represented.

Dr. Mary A. Snowe, a Chicago specialist, attended the revival and vouched for the healings to the city press. She brought different patients of her own for help, and gave to the press the story of one particular healing.

An ex-congressman from the state of Delaware declared from the platform that he wished to take his stand publicly for Christ. It was a touching scene. He had formerly paid the personal physician of ex-President Wilson one thousand dollars to make one trip from Washington, D. C. to his home.

One prominent professional citizen, who had \$12,500 worth of liquors that were being kept in secret, became deeply convicted, and destroyed them. "If I break the bottles, I will lose my money," was the statement of this party, "but if I sell the stuff, I'll lose my soul."

Mrs. Wideman, of Unadilla, N. Y., a graduate of the Boston Conservatory of Music in violin, piano, harp, came for prayer. She had a drainage tube in her side which the physicians said they believed could never be removed as long as she lived. Brother J. R. Spence writes from So. China, "We praise God that despite the war, and there has been nothing like it in South China for many long years, God is blessing and at most of our stations crowds are good and interest is manifested. The other Sunday nine were baptized at Fatshan and the hearts of the girls there are much encouraged. At Sainam, here we expect to have a baptismal service next Sunday when three or four will be baptized, and the following Sunday I am wanted at Lopau where God is wonderfully blessing and quite a few converts are ready for baptism.

"God is wonderfully working in Brother Williamson's work at Waitsap and Leung Tsuen and I must make another trip up there for quite a number are waiting for baptism. There is also a new out-station to be opened. That is about a two weeks job in itself. There is also a new outstation to be opened north of Lopau, in fact the preacher is going up today to commence business. It is called Shek Kok, and can be overseen from Lopau.

"In connection with Brother Williamson's work 5714 Gospels have been sold and these have been scattered through a wide district. Through the work of the colporteur an opening has been secured in a large market town and the people are very anxious for a mission. I expect to go and look at the place for myself.
"A note of praise has to be sounded

to our God for His care over us. None of our missionaries or mission stations have been molested during the conflict and the general health of all is good. Wife and I need to be brought faithfully before the throne daily, that we may have wisdom and strength for the work that lies to our hands and for grace to enable us to make the most of every opportunity. We like the appearance of the Evangel. What a ministry it has and what a ministry it will have-greater than we ever thought of. What would not our Chinese Christians give for such a paper in Chinese."

MINING SOULS IN THE CONGO

Brother J. A. Barney writes from the Congo, "We are at it, blasting deep, cleaning up the rubbish and making quite an excavation. As yet we have not found much real metal. I say much, for there is a little in sight, just enough to keep us encouraged and keep us digging. There is a great deal of imitation, there are quantities of debris, BUT GOD!!! But there is some real metal, buried gold, tarnished gold, "black" gold, mixed gold, BUT THERE IS GOLD! FROM SOUTH INDIA

Robert F. Cook writes of the work in South India, "As the work in Travancore State is making such rapid progress, and the outlook for greater success is promising, we are praying the Lord will send someone to take over the work at Dodhallapur in Mysore State as we feel we must put all our energy into the needy fields of Travancore. I told our Indian Christians we would appreciate the rains more when they came. It is so hot that I cannot get out very much.

"The preacher that meets the trains sold forty-four gospels and gave away 1268 tracts in 7 weeks, over 800 of which were given out in a mela. That is very good for a small place like this, where so few can read. Thank you for your prayers."

EVANGELIZING JAPAN

Brother John W. Juergensen writes from Toyko-Fu, Japan, "The first two weeks in June we held two weeks of special meetings in one of the stations. We got permission from the police to march the streets changing our route every night we went. We carried lanterns and one beat the drum while we sang. After every verse and chorus or so we would stop and one of the workers or Christians announced who we were, where from and for what purpose we were marching around. Coming back to the mission in front of which we erected a large sign extending to the street in a triangle we held a street meeting and crowds gathered and many followed us in. God gave us a real inspiration as we preached about the rich fool, prodigal son, the only foundation, etc. Many gathered around the altar until there was no room to invite more. We are encouraged to press on, knowing that a rich harvest awaits us.

"We are very much burdened for the lack of laborers in Japan. Half the population of the United States and only two men and five women missionaries representing the Assemblies of God. It is true that there are a number of church missionaries, and the Japanese like that kind of faith, as they call it, for they can just believe in Christ and still go to the movies, dances, pool-parlors, etc., which are the craze in Japan just now. Oh that God will raise up laborers for Japan who will preach real repentance, sanctification and the Baptism in the Spirit. While we may not have a church on every corner, we can believe God for a Pentecostal church in every city. Please help us to believe."

A QUESTION

Ques. If a sum of money has been given for the foreign field and the missionary stays in this country, not going back, would it be right to ask and to get part of the money back again, as it was given for the salvation of souls in the foreign fields?

Ans. It would not be right for a missionary who collects money to take him to the foreign field for missionary work to settle down at home and to use the money for his own personal needs. All missionaries who receive the endorsement of the General Council are expected to abide by its decisions on missionary matters. We have a resolution which reads as follows:

"Resolved. That we heartily recommend that funds received by prospective missionaries which are intended for outfit, passage or expenses while on the field, should be deposited with the Missionary Treasurer or other responsible agency, and should such prospective missionary be prevented from going forward to the field, for any reason, such funds shall be either returned to the parties from whom received, if desired by them, or made available for other missionaries or missionary purposes."

VICTORIES IN PERU

Brother J. R. Hurlburt writes from Callao, Peru, "Thank God, we have pulled through the influenza epidemic safely and have regained strength. I was so weak for several days that I feared I would go, but opening my Bible one morning, the Lord gave me this beautiful promise, Psa. 118:17, 'I shall not die, but live, and declare the work of the Lord.'

"On Sunday June 3, we held a special service commemorating the first anniversary of our work here. We had a good attendance and I gave a report of the work done during the year. A man and his wife asked to be received as members of the assembly, and three others asked for baptism.

"On Friday, June 8th, we had the first baptismal service and the three persons mentioned above were buried with Christ in the watery grave, to arise with Him in newness of life.

"It seems that this month of Jun2 is going to bring a few victories. Yesterday I was called to the home of the father of the young woman who was baptized. I found the old father so sick with the Flu that some of the relatives had persuaded the mother to call in the priest to give him the extreme unction. The old man rejected the services of the priest who gathered up all his paraphernalia and went away angrily. I assured them that I had not come to persuade them to pass over to our religion, but only to speak to them about Christ and to pray for Senor Andrade. They all listened attentively to the reading of a chapter and the lady then spread a nice piece of carpet for me to kneel on. They knelt with me and Andrade covered his face with his hands. The Lord gave the spirit of prayer from which I arose, and laying my hands upon Andrade, rebuked the sickness in Jesus' name.

"I returned again this morning and I found the relatives had all gone away. The man's wife met me at the entrance and the old lady was all smiles. Tengo muchisma fe—I have very much faith, for Andrade has amended much and has been sitting up in the bed conversing and says he does not want any more medicine' I trust this incident will turn several Roman Catholic everytheres witnesses to the Lord."

Several blind children have received their sight; one man who has been critically ill through an injury has been raised up by the Lord and a boy with a very badly infected head is recovering. All of these cases were hopeless as far as human instrumentality was concerned, but the Lord is proving to these Chinese His power to heal the sick, and consequently there is a great stir among some who are not yet saved. I realize more than ever my utter dependence upon the Lord that He might show forth His power.

"I long to be able to speak the language so that I might be able to deal personally with the sick. The many branches of the work have become well adjusted. There is a spirit of co-operation throughout the compound. New buildings are going up. The flour mill has arrived but the buildings will have to first be built for that purpose before anything is done along that line.
